


Operational Medicine














After graduating from college and medical school at Harvard, Dr. Louis H. Bauer began his career in the Army Medical Corps. His military career was highly successful as he served as Director of the Medical Research Laboratory after WWI, helped to establish the Army School of Aviation Medicine for flight surgeons in 1922, and served as commandant of the school for 6 years.





Medical Standards Directory (MSD)

- USAF has RETENTION and SPECIAL DUTY standards (among others)
 - RETENTION Standards used to determine if a service member should remain in the Air Force.
 - SPECIAL DUTY Standards used to determine if a service member should remain on "special duty".

✓ Pilot, Air Traffic Control, Flight Engineer, Flight Nurse, Loadmaster, etc.
